Red Ribbon Week, which is celebrated annually October 23-31, is the nation's oldest and largest drug prevention awareness program. It was started after the death of Drug Enforcement Administration (DEA) Special Agent Enrique "Kiki" Camarena, who in 1985 was brutally tortured and murdered by drug traffickers he was investigating in Mexico. As a tribute to SA Camarena, friends and neighbors began wearing red badges of satin. Coalitions, made up of groups of people who were tired of the devastation drugs and alcohol were causing, began forming to embrace Special Agent Camarena's belief that one person can make a difference in the battle against drugs.

Today, more than 25 years after the first official national Red Ribbon Week celebration, wearing red ribbons during the month of October continues to represent our pledge to live drug free and honors the sacrifice of all who have lost their lives in the fight against drugs.

Red Ribbon Week offers a great opportunity for the community - parents; teachers; school nurses, counselors and coaches; youth, faith based and community organizations - to provide awareness and encourage the choice to live a drug free life.

The Red Rock Regional Prevention Coordinator celebrates this week along with many schools in the area to raise awareness about living a drug free life.
